






The Evidence-Based Funding Formula, enacted in 2017, created an equitable framework for assessing how much funding each district needs to support its specific student population. The formula also determines how close each district is to reaching that level and distributes new dollars equitably.

However, the system cannot achieve equitable funding unless significant funds are devoted to the formula annually. The law sets a "Minimum Funding Level" of \$350 million each year, and that goal has been met in each year but one. At this rate, it will take over two decades to reach adequate funding.

An increase of \$550 million in the next budget would step up Illinois' path to adequacy and put us on track to reach full funding within 10 years. Over half of Illinois' students - more than one million children - attend underfunded schools. We need a path to funding adequacy, not a path to continued mediocrity.



Youth Justice

Illinois youth can face fees and fines at every stage of the juvenile court process – everything from administrative costs to public defender fees to DNA tests. These fees, which are unrelated to victim's restitution, can quickly add up and disproportionally impact low-income youth and their families. A family's inability to pay can lead to years of escalating debt that can force families to choose between paying down these debts or paying for essentials like groceries or rent.

While these payments can be a significant burden for Illinois families, they are not a significant source of revenue for county courts. Less than 0.01% of circuit court revenue consists of collected juvenile court fees and fines in Illinois. This tiny slice is an average of \$785,065 across the 90 counties where data was available. Recognizing this, 20 states—both majority Democratic and majority Republican—have eliminated juvenile court fines and fees since 2015 in a movement called Debt Free Justice.

Municipal ticketing in schools is a related issue that can have similar financial repercussions for families. An investigation by ProPublica and the Chicago Tribune found nearly 12,000 tickets issued to students referred by their public schools. Many of these are for minor infractions such as vaping but the tickets can require a mandatory appearance at a municipal hearing, requiring students to miss school, and conclude with fines that can amount to hundreds of dollars. Literacy & Justice For All

Half of Illinois third graders 'partially met' or



'did not meet' Illinois' reading benchmarks. The literacy crisis is urgent but solvable.

Most states have enacted literacy reform in recent years, but states that have shown the most success have recognized the complexity of the issues and developed a multi-pronged approach, supported with funding and strong leadership from their state education agency. We support these policies:


- Increasing funding for the Early Childhood Block Grant by \$120 million.
- Ensuring teacher candidates understand how the brain is re-wired as children learn to read and how explicit, systematic instruction connecting spoken sounds to written letters supports that process.
- Providing professional development opportunities to teachers and administrators on the most up-to-date research on literacy instruction.
- Developing an evaluation tool to ensure new literacy curricula aligns with learning standards.


